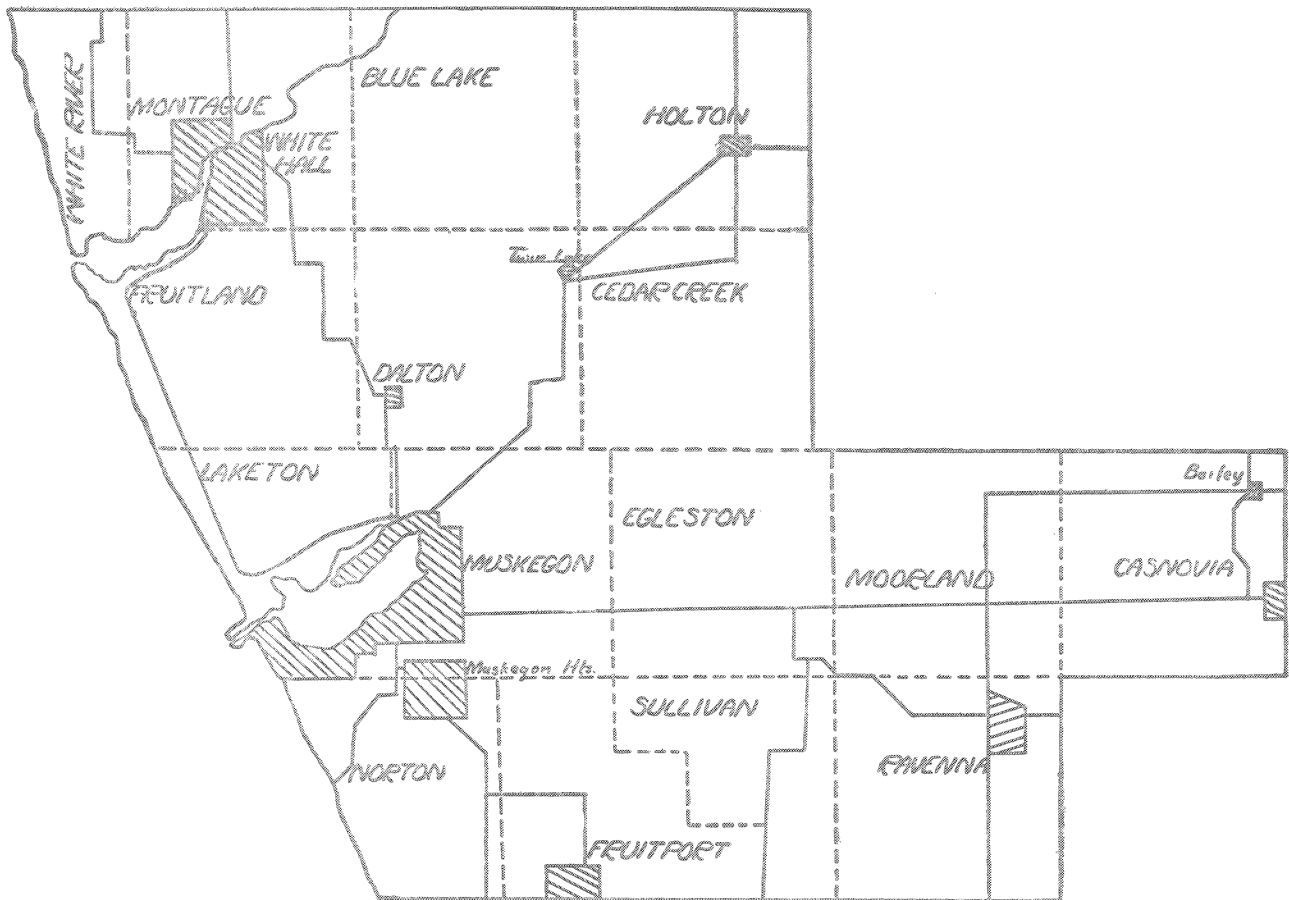

INTRODUCTION

The following pages contain the history of Muskegon County Governmental activities for the year 1951.

An attempt has been made to include financial and statistical data from as many departments of the government as possible. The splendid cooperation of most departments, in supplying the needed information, has made this report a reality.

FINANCIAL REPORT

From a financial standpoint, the condition of the County government is not good. During 1951, four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) was borrowed from a local bank to meet county obligations during the closing days of the year. Furthermore, it appears that another loan will be required during the last quarter in 1952 to finance the operation of the county government.

An analysis of information in the following pages reveals that the total general fund appropriation by the Board of Supervisors for the fiscal year 1951 was \$1,081,422.00. Actual expenditures and commitments exceeded this amount by \$35,263.53.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In regard to the matter of over-expending appropriations, the Controller will authorize no expenditures in any department beyond budget limitations.

The Controller recommends to the Board that department heads be directed to request in writing from the Finance Committee any additional funds, beyond the amount originally appropriated, which may be needed to continue their operations during the coming year.

The Controller further requests authority to withhold payment of any invoice received by the county when any purchase is made without an authorized purchase order. Statutory authority is contained in Section 46.13b, Compiled Laws (1948).

CONCLUSION

If the above two recommendations are followed, a long forward step will have been taken toward the all-important objective of "living within the budget".

Any criticism or suggestion for improving the annual report will be most welcome.

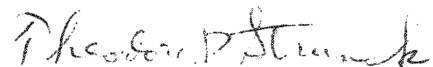

We have never been able to spare a clerk to accurately tabulate the number of incoming telephone calls nor the number of people who come in for assistance each day. We do have two phones and they are busy almost all of the time, and there is usually someone waiting to talk with the Friend of the Court.

1947 - fines collected..... \$ 3,890.00

1951 - fines collected..... 1,797.00

However, there were 561 more receipts issued in 1951 than in 1945. Inasmuch as the caseload has varied but little, this means we are having to press harder to collect the fines and costs and we are taking the payments in lesser amounts. Only a few of the probationers would ever pay if they weren't pushed to make them do it.

**In 1949 we had a slump in this department, too, while Muskegon was having its own "Little Recession".

Pre-sentence investigations and reports are one of the most important services which this office renders to the Courts. In all criminal cases we are required to file this report which covers the prisoner's family background, past criminal record, home and social conditions, physical and mental health, and all possible information available on the crime committed. This information is submitted to the Court to enable the sentencing judge to better determine a just sentence. If the prisoner is sentenced, the report goes with him to the prison where it is used by the prison authorities. Pre-sentence reports ordered each year are as follows:

As you can see, these reports are increasing considerably with the continued increase in crime in Muskegon County.

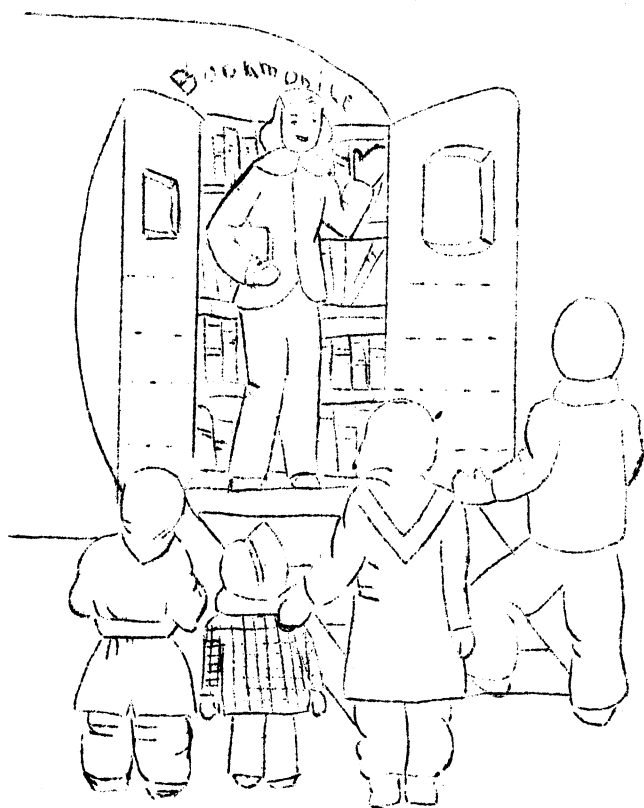

The Bookmobile service starts with the first day of school and serves every school in Muskegon County outside the city limits of Muskegon and Muskegon Heights. That means setting up a library in all of our 70 schools. Eight of our 17 suburban schools had grown until the library rooms are now class rooms. Collection of books are set up in each room, and it takes a full day to exchange their collections, where formerly we were able to visit two in one day. The suburban school enrollments range from 110 to 1,025 pupils. We have two 9 room schools, one 8 room, one 6 room, two four room and 39 - 1 room schools with enrollments ranging from 18 to 50 people. An emergency at the County Library due to a shortage of two staff members, made it necessary to discontinue Bookmobile service during the summer months to children in the suburban areas. Instead, the Bookmobile and its staff consisting of two people were used during the summer months to serve the seven branch libraries in the County and took part in shifting their book collections. The Library regretted having to do this and have received many expressions of disappointment because there was no service to those suburban area children during the summer. The service to this area will be continued this coming summer.

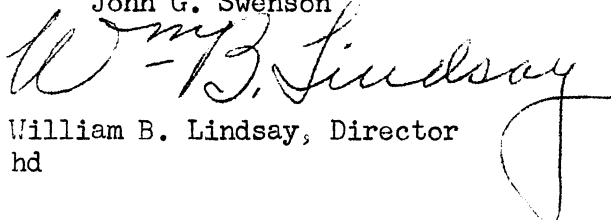
Incorporated in this report is a brief summary of the activities of the

The Muskegon County Bureau of Social Aid, in following the practice established last year, is submitting a report of its activities for the year 1951.

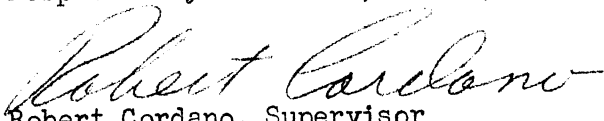
As the initial report was very comprehensive, we will attempt to summarize the situation in the past year.

The two most noticeable changes are:

1. Approval by the State of the Muskegon County Convalescent Hospital, which resulted in grants being made to eligible persons there. In December, 1951 we made payments to forty-six old age assistance clients and five aid to the disabled clients totaling \$3,780.50.
2. The aid to the disabled program starting January, 1951. At the end of the year the Bureau had twenty-one active aid to the disabled cases.

This year we are including a breakdown by townships and cities of our case load.
